


DEGREE VS. ON-THE-JOB TRAINING: HOW MUCH WILL YOU MAKE?

Time-Based: Break your goal down into pieces so you can easily meet your deadline.


The Perfect 10 Study Habits

Oklahoma's Promise


To qualify, students must -

- apply in the 8th, 9th, 10th or 11th grade
- be a resident of Oklahoma
- · complete a specific high school curriculum
- achieve at least a 2.50 GPA both in the curriculum and overall
- abide by certain conduct standards

The federal AGI of the student's family may not exceed -

- \$60,000 for parents with 1 or 2 dependent children
- \$70,000 for parents with 3 or 4 dependent children
- \$80,000 for parents with 5 or more dependent children at the time of application, and \$100,000 each year the student is enrolled in postsecondary education

Oklahoma's Promise will pay resident tuition at a public college or a portion of tuition at private institutions or public technology centers in Oklahoma. Learn more at okpromise.org.

Knowing how to PLAN, RESEARCH, APPLY and TRACK applications will increase your chances of earning valuable awards. UCanGo2.org offers resources and publications to help as you plan, prepare and pay for your education after high school.

- · Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, in your senior year of high school and each year you need financial aid for education expenses. Learn more at FAFSA.gov.

Scholarship Essay Tips The scholarship essay is a chance for you to shine and to set yourself apart from other

scholarship applicants. Writing a good essay is key to winning a scholarship so use these tips to help you move to the top of the list

Scholarship essays are used by providers to:

- Find students who meet certain criteria.
- Get to know you as a student and person.
- Make sure your experience and interests coincide with the organization's mission

Keep these tips in mind when writing your scholarship essay:

- ► Take writing your essay seriously; remember it's key to earning the scholarship.
- Make sure your essay is honest, original, conveys your personality and captivates
- Be organized, meet all requirements, and don't rush through your essay. Be prepared to answer the scholarship question (sometimes called a prompt) on a variety of topics, which might include:
- Future academic or life plans
- Personal history
- Current events or social issues
- Achievements

- Read the directions carefully before you start.
- Be aware of deadlines.
- Brainstorm ideas and create an outline
- Write a rough draft, a second draft and then a final copy.
- Start over if you finish and your work doesn't seem to fit the scholarsh
- Use personal and real stories. The scholarship provider wants to know
- Use spell check, proofread and be mindful of vocabulary and gramm costly. Make use of online grammar and writing tools.
- Sample Essay Questions or Prompts:
- Describe an experience that changed your life. What did you learn? Ho experience influence you moving forward?
- Advice is sometimes easier to give than to follow. Share a piece of adv and why you should have followed it.
- Describe an innovative project you designed, the goal of your project, Be prepared to provide supporting documentation
- Write a letter explaining your need for this scholarship, your plans for h and your future career goals. Climate change is impacting the world in dramatic ways. If you were th







- Start your scholarship search. Scholarships are called "five money" because they don't have to be paid back! They're given to students based on financial need, talents or life experience. Your counselor will have information about scholarships available in your area. You can start to apply for scholarships inght now if you do some research for eligible programs. Visit [Varifox] and [Visite] legislating to search for scholarships.
- Socialize. Are you involved in any clubs, special interest or service groups? Find a group that sparks your talents and interests. Keep track of your extracurricular activities and volunteer work for college scholarship applications.
- Save away. When you get extra money for work, birthdays or holidays, stash some of it away in your savings account for future expenses.

- Make courses count. Choose challenging classes that will give you a head start for high school and college. Learn more about graduation and college entrance requirements in the Prepare section for high school students at <u>UCanGo2 org</u>.
- Grab a partner. Ask an adult to help you research your options to see what would fit best with your college plans. See <u>UCanGo2 org</u> for tips on planning, preparing and paying for college.
- Sign up. Qualifying students can sign up for the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program in the 8th, 9th, 10th or 11th grade. Don't miss out on this apportunity to ear thee college tutions at an Oklahoma college or career technology center. More information about slightly is lated below. Oklahoma's Promise is a scholarship program that pays full or partial college tuition at many Oklahoma schools. To see if you might qualify for the program, check every statement below that applies to you and your family.

- My family meets the income requirements outlined at <u>OKPromise.org</u> (special income provisions apply to certain adopted children and children in the custody of court-appointed legal guardians).
- [I'm in the 8th, 9th, 10th or 11th grade (or I'm a homeschooled student who is 13, 14 or 15 years old).
- I'm a resident of Oklahoma.
- I can meet the requirements of the Oklahoma's Promise program
- I'll graduate from an Oklahoma high school or homeschool education program.
- √ I'll take 17 units of specific college-prep curriculum.
- √ I'll achieve at least a 2.50 GPA both in the curriculum and overall.
- √ I'll attend school regularly.
- ✓ I'll do my homework.
- I'll stay away from drugs and alcohol.
- I won't commit criminal or delinquent acts.
- \checkmark I'll meet with a school official to go over my school work and records on a regular basis.
- I'll apply for other financial aid during my serior year of high school and every year I am enrolled in college by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- √ I'll take part in Oklahoma's Promise activities that will help me prepare for college.

If you were able to check all four statements above, be sure to apply for Oklahoma's Promise while you're in the 8th, 9th, 10th or 11th grade. Check out OKPnomise.org for more information.



ASK YOUR SCHOOL COUNSELOR

Each year as you grow older, you become more responsible for yourself. Preparing for education after high school is no exception and requires some action on your part. If you want to go to college, it's up to you to visit with your counselor about your options and ask questions. Your counselor has information about how to plan, prepare and pay for education after high school. All you have to do is ask.

Not sure how to get started? Try asking your counselor some of these questions.

- Do you have any information about careers that would match my skills and talents?
- What classes will I have to take in high school in order to graduate and be ready for college?
- How can I be sure I stay on track so I don't miss any required courses?
- What will I need to do to make it into the Honor Society in high school, and how will that help me?
- Are there any committees, groups or other activities I can volunteer for that would help me prepare for college?
- Are there scholarship websites or resources I can start to explore now?
- How do I apply for the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship?
- Do you know of any after-school or evening college planning or FAFSA events that I can attend with my parents?
- Where have other kids from this school gone to college?
